New face for Yanchep Sun City

A NEW face at Yanchep Sun City will lead the St Andrews project into its next phase of stakeholder management, community development and employment creation.

Nobu Kawasaki takes over from Arthur Ikeda as Yanchep Sun City managing director to mark the beginning of new developments.

At a farewell presentation for Arthur at Club Capricorn last month, Nobu said he was looking forward to working with the local community on the project.

"I believe that what we build together will significantly improve our enjoyment of this special place and all it has to offer."

Nobu has an impressive international record of delivering highly successful outcomes to a number of Tokyu's large scale projects in Hawaii, San Francisco and Seattle.

In a moving speech to key stakeholders, Tokyu employees, and representatives community from consultancy Creating Communities and the City of Wanneroo, Mr Ikeda said that he was sad to leave the St Andrews project but would continue to watch it develop with great interest in the "competent hands of Mr Nobu Kawasaki".

Mr Ikeda has been promoted to Executive General Manager of Tokyu's overseas division based in Japan.

Million dollar tree funding

YANCHEP District High Year 4 students took part in Yanchep Sun City's greening program recently by planting hundreds of native trees at the end of the proposed Marmion Road extension.

For the last 17 years, Tokyu Corporation has pumped over six million dollars into planting hundreds of thousands of native trees. shrubs, ground covers environmental and preservation measures at Yanchep and Two Rocks.

Teacher Naomi Shaw said she is verv enthusiastic about the program and is keen to get her students involved.

"I'm real а environmentalist and I think it's really important for kids to


be aware of their environment from as young as possible - this is the third time we have planted trees this year," she said.

Sun City Nursery senior supervisor Allan Munro has been planting trees for Tokyu for the last four years.

"Each year I plant about three to five thousand trees as part of the program, but not all of them will survive due to things like cattle, vermin or drought. So if we need three thousand trees, we'll plant five thousand."

Yanchep Sun City managing director Nobu Kawasaki and executive manager Yoshi Ogata said the program plays an important role in environmental management as well as beautifying the area.

"Tree planting is necessary to stop soil

erosion and for sand dune protection, and Yanchep Sun City is committed to preserving the environment," Nobu said. Up to 14 different types of native trees are planted each year including Geraldton Wax. Coral Gum and Bottlebrushes which are suited to harsh coastal conditions.

Local charity gets a boost

LOCAL charity Yanchep Two Rocks Home Support could have been hard hit by spiralling public liability insurance costs if it weren't for a \$2000 donation from Yanchep Sun City.

The not-for-profit organisation which provides elderly residents with equipment and services wrote to a number of organisations, including Yanchep Sun City, earlier this year asking for sponsorship and donations to assist with its \$3500 annual insurance and administration costs. "We've never had a donation of this size before and it will be a great help – we really appreciate the good that the company is doing for the local community," Yanchep Two Rocks Home Support treasurer Phil Renkin said.

Yanchep Sun City managing director Nobu Kawasaki, who presented the cheque to Mr Renkin, said that the company was proud to assist such a dedicated charity.

"Yanchep Two Rocks Home Support plays a very important role in the local community, and hopefully this donation will enable it to continue with its invaluable service to the community," he said.

Yanchep Sun City has provided support to a number of community groups over the years including sponsorship of the community bus service, the annual Australia Day Breakfast and has made contributions to the Yanchep Two Rocks Art Society.

Yanchep Two Rocks Home Support was established in 1995 to provide equipment such as wheel chairs, hospice beds and crutches to elderly residents as well as volunteer services such as gardening and house maintenance.

Less red tape for St Andrews project

THE recent Federal Government support for the St Andrews IDEA project marks the turning point in the project's development.

St Andrews has now been granted major project facilitation status by the Commonwealth Government's investment attraction agency, Invest Australia, which will help with a fast approvals process for the development.

Co-chair of the project strategic implementation committee and Wanneroo MLA Dianne Guise said the IDEA project has been recognised for its unique approach to economic development, job creation and urban development.

"This status will provide timely approvals from the Government and help cut through the red tape," she said.

"The support from the Federal Government

will also facilitate memorandums of understanding with industries at the cutting edge of technology."

Fellow project co-chairperson Dusan Mills said this is the first time an urban economic development project has received this kind of support.

"I'm incredibly pleased as this is the first and only urban project in Australia to receive this status," he said.

"Some companies have specific requirements which involves the Federal Government. However, as the Federal Government is very busy, this can be a very lengthy process. But with this facilitation status, we are in a position to fast-track Federal Government approvals, and therefore attract these companies to the area," explained Mr Mills.

"It also means St Andrews is eligible for

various support programs and funding to attract investors to the area."

The St Andrews IDEA project has been granted major project facilitation status until December 2003, when it expected to be renewed.

The implementation committee has already begun working on a report which will cover progress on urban and economic development so far and will look at what steps will be taken next.

"The aim is to create 1000 jobs in the next five years, which is just the beginning," Ms Guise said.

Big ideas for Yanchep

IT'S BEEN four years in the making and a long hard slog, but the IDEA project team is starting to reap some rewards following the Federal Government's support for St Andrews and notable economic development progress.

An Aged Care application, which has strong local community support, has recently been submitted to the Federal Government and is expected to be processed by November this year.

The IDEA project is also targeting other 'knowledge' industries which have shown strong expressions of interest, including some memorandums of understanding.

However, member of the economic development group Phil Lori said that sustainable economic development involves a lengthy process.

"Attracting companies to the area won't happen over night – it takes time to learn how to do that and create what is needed to get these industries interested," he said.

As part of this learning process, representatives from Tokyu, the City of Wanneroo and key figures in the IDEA project have recently embarked on a

Who is Tokyu?

THE Tokyu group has long been on the cutting edge of international urban development, so when it was first invited to participate in the Yanchep Two Rocks project in 1973, it saw great potential for the area.

The Japanese company has an impressive list of successful development projects under its belt including the multi award winning Tama Garden City with a population of 500,000 located 15km outside of Tokyo.

Tama Garden City commenced in 1953 and has succeeded in achieving its goal of creating a truly prosperous, community orientated development which spans over 5000 hectares.

On the tranquil Kohala

Coast of Hawaii, Tokyu saw an opportunity to develop Mauna Lani, a 12,000 hectare resort consisting of two hotels, two golf courses and multiple apartments. Mauna Lani was named by Hawaiian elders, meaning 'mountain reaching heaven', and has continued to preserve the area's history and environment, making it one of the greatest resort developments in the world today.


With more than 480 companies and 10 corporations world wide covering a wide spectrum of sectors including hotel management, airline management, information businesses, leisure services and many more, Tokyu has come a long way since its humble beginnings as a railroad business in 1922.

As with all its projects, Tokyu will closely
